One hundred years ago this January, the 18th Amendment became law. This Amendment made the sale, manufacture or transportation of alcohol illegal. Prohibition, as it was called would last until 1933. This "dry" movement was led by Protestants and other groups such as the Women's Christian Temperance Union. The Catholics and German Lutheran communities of south Louisiana and many businesses were opposed to the new law when they recognized the economic hardships it would create.

Thousands of breweries and saloons were shuttered, jobs and taxes were lost and the rise of gangland crime and bootlegging became rampant. It is said that so much illegal liquor

was smuggled into Louisiana that the prices actually declined and that New Orleans was the "wettest" city in America.

Transporting moonshine, drivers made resourceful changes to their vehicles to outrun and elude the authorities. This led to stock car racing and would eventually evolve into what is now known as NASCAR.

Meanwhile in Gretna, the wedding of Miss Anna Jordano and Anthony Spera was celebrated at St. Joseph Church. Anna's father Gilardo and brother Frank could not attend the wedding because they were behind bars at the Gretna Prison. They had been convicted of the ax murder of little Mary Cortimiglia, who was portrayed twice in our Cemetery Tour. After the wedding, guests flocked to the jail yard where the reception was held.

The Jordano's were later released. They had been wrongly accused!

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ABOUT THE GHS AND HOW TO JOIN

The Gretna Historical Society was founded in Gretna, Louisiana, in 1969, by Lloyd E. Gomez (insurance man, volunteer firefighter, and community activist), who descended from Gretna pioneers, German immigrants Claudius and Catherine Nuss Strehle. The articles of incorporation for the GHS were drafted by Gretna attorney Everette F. Gauthreaux and signed in his law office on October 26, 1969. Today, the GHS operates the Gretna Historical Society Museum Complex at the corner of Lafayette Street at Second. It consists of three 19th century Creole cottages, a blacksmith shop, and the Louisiana Fire Museum. The GHS also owns and maintains the caboose and train depot on Huey P. Long Avenue at Fourth Street.

There are no requirements for membership in the GHS, other than the timely payment of annual membership dues of \$20 per person.

Monthly meetings are held at the GHS Museum Complex, 209 Lafayette Street, on the second Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. Guests and prospective members are always welcome to attend the meetings. The society's newsletter, Gretna Chronicles, is published monthly and mailed to all members.
