

GHS Museum Complex Reopens





GRID Card

One of the joys of growing up in 1960's Gretna was the anticipation of receiving the coveted GRID card. It arrived in the mail after school let out for summer. The bearer was entitled to one free swim session per punch with one card good for 90 punches. There were three swim sessions per day, Monday thru Saturday. Night sessions and Sunday were not included with the card.

A cinder block building sat on a shell lot in front of the pool and the shells were not meant for tender feet. Your card would be punched here before entering with boys going to the left and girls to the right. Once inside, the basket attendant gave you a numbered wire basket and a

matching numbered pin. After changing into your bathing suit, you placed your belongings in the basket that the attendant stored in the basket room. Swimmers kept the numbered pin to later retrieve their possessions. A mandatory walk or run through the cold shower tunnel reeking of chlorine came next and finally, you would approach the pool. It was huge with a capacity of 900 swimmers. It was divided down the middle with a rope separating the shallow from the deep end. There were four diving boards, two of which were called Hell Divers because they were so high, only for the brave!

When the session ended you were rather hungry from all that swimming. The Dairy Dip just across the railroad track solved the problem. If you hurried you might avoid the line to place your order. To all the swimmers, it was the best ice cream or hot dog in the world!

By the end of the summer that pristine GRID card that had come in the mail had become an old punched, wrinkled, mushy piece of paper. But, oh what fun it gave. Growing up in Gretna in the 60's was a wonderful experience!

GHS Loses Members During the COVID-19 Pandemic

Jefferson Parish lost the primary keeper and recorder of its history with the passing of Dr. Mary Grace Curry on April 6, 2020, at the age of 72. She was the only child of the late Clyde L. Curry and Gladys Ehret Curry and the great-granddaughter of John Ehret, the first mayor of the city of Gretna. She is survived by her lifelong friend John Potero and a host of cousins and friends.

Mary was Valedictorian for Holy Name of Mary High School, Class of 1965. She earned undergraduate and master's degrees in biology from UNO in 1969 and 1971, respectively, and her doctorate in botany in 1973 from LSU. Her curriculum vitae contained a list of biological and environmental articles that included her master's thesis and Ph.D. dissertation. She wrote more than fifty articles in scientific and professional journals and was an assistant professor of biology at Loyola University.

She served Jefferson Parish Government for over 30 years, as Environmental Impact Officer and Director of the Department of Solid Waste and Environmental Impact. She spent the last few years of her parish career in the Historical Commission's Archives room at the East Bank Regional Library where she participated in her heartfelt interest, the history of the parish and the City of Gretna. She categorized items of historical significance for placement in the forthcoming official Jefferson Parish Archives Building.

Her maternal ancestors settled in Gretna during antebellum days, her love for history began with stories about the history of Gretna that her mother told her as a child. Her parents were charter members of GHS, she followed them serving as archivist, president, longtime Board Historian, sesquicentennial committee chairperson, and brilliantly as Chairperson of the Historic District Committee.

During 1982, she prepared nominations for citations in the National Register of Historic Places of such Gretna landmarks as the David Crockett Firehall and Steam Pumper, Gretna City Hall and St. Joseph Catholic Church and Most Holy Sacrament Convent Complex. She worked tirelessly for two years to have The City of Gretna nominated as a National Register Historic District.

She was appointed to Gretna's Zoning Advisory Board, the Committee for Tourism and received the United Daughters of the Confederacy's Jefferson Davis Medal in 1986.

Dr. Curry was a past president of the Jefferson Historical Society of Louisiana, on the Board of Directors for many years. She was Chairlady of the Jefferson Parish Historical Commission. She was a founding member of the Friends of the German-American Cultural Center and president of the German Heritage, Cultural and Genealogical Society.

Mary was the author of "Gretna-A Sesquicentennial Salute", a definitive history of the City of Gretna in 1986. She wrote Jefferson History Notebooks and other publications of the Commission.

Dr. Curry took particular pride in her membership in many lineage organizations including The Daughters of the American Revolution, The Daughters of the War of 1812 and the Colonial Dames of the 17th Century. She was also founding and current President of the David Crockett Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, at one time, the largest chapter of the UDC in the State of Louisiana. She was a devoted parishioner of St. Angela Merici Church in Metairie where she attended Mass every day following her retirement. Private graveside services were held in Westlawn Cemetery.

A testimony to a life well lived with a definite purpose can be found in the dedication of her book back in 1986: "I dedicate this book to my mother, Gladys Ehret Curry who from my earliest recollections made the history of Gretna omnipresent in my life and to my great grandfather, John Ehret without whom no history of Gretna or Jefferson Parish would be complete."



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ABOUT THE GHS AND HOW TO JOIN

The Gretna Historical Society was founded in Gretna, Louisiana, in 1969, by Lloyd E. Gomez (insurance man, volunteer firefighter, and community activist), who descended from Gretna pioneers, German immigrants Claudius and Catherine Nuss Strehle. The articles of incorporation for the GHS were drafted by Gretna attorney Everette F. Gauthreaux and signed in his law office on October 26, 1969. Today, the GHS operates the Gretna Historical Society Museum Complex at the corner of Lafayette Street at Second. It consists of three 19th century Creole cottages, a blacksmith shop, and the Louisiana Fire Museum. The GHS also owns and maintains the caboose and train depot on Huey P. Long Avenue at Fourth Street.

There are no requirements for membership in the GHS, other than the timely payment of annual membership dues of \$20 per person.

Monthly meetings are held at the St. Joseph's Auditorium at 7th and Newton Streets on the second Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. Guests and prospective members are always welcome to attend the meetings. The society's newsletter, Gretna Chronicles, is published monthly and mailed to all members.
