Wilty to set a time.

"Westside & the New Bridge"

In 1901 the Stump family purchased a large parcel of land. During the first 50 years of ownership, dairy cows grazed and long staple cotton and horse beans were grown. There was even an oil well drilled on the land. The property was in an ideal location, directly in the flow of the new Westbank Expressway and GNO bridge traffic.

Dr. John F. Stumpf, a dentist, conceived, planned and spearheaded the largest and finest shopping center in Southeastern Louisiana. This offered locals plus the expected boom of new residents the opportunity to shop as never before.


Unfortunately Dr.
Stumpf did not live to see the completion of his \$32,000,000 project.
However, his father,

Archie C. Stumpf, and his uncle, Senator Alvin T. Stumpf, carried on the family interest.

On Jan. 31, 1958, Westside Shopping Center opened with great fanfare. Jets flew overhead and a brand new 1958 Buick Riviera was given away. Throngs of people turned out, overflowing the 2,000 space parking lot onto the new expressway service road. Dr. Stumpf's daughter, Susan Stumpf, officially dedicated the center. Nat B. Knight Jr., manager of the shopping center and master of the dedication, paid tribute to the late Dr. Stumpf for his

vision, skill and labor that went into the center. Gov. Earl Long, principal speaker, congratulated the developers.

Gretna Mayor William J. White said, "Today is a great day in the City of Gretna and the entire

Westbank. Just a few years ago this area was just open fields and woods, like those you see across the expressway. Take a good look at those woods, because in a few years there will be no woods left in the City of Gretna."

After the ceremony, crowds of people surged into the 20 stores of the new shopping center as doors were thrown open. Maison Blanche, the anchor store, was also celebrating its 50th anniversary. Other businesses were Baker's,

Duane's and Thom McAn Shoe Stores, Stumpf's Rexall Drugs, A & G Cafeteria, First National Bank, Gordon's Jewelry, Gulf Oil Service Station, Halpern's Fabrics, Sutton's, F. W. Woolworth, Labiche's, Lerner's, Lord's, McKenzie's Bakery, National Food Store, Stein's, Western Auto, Ilenberger's Garden Center and Jefferson Insurance Agency. Shopping on the Westbank was forever changed!

By 1959, just as Mayor White had predicted, woods were cleared and multiple neighborhoods would open within the City of Gretna.

The opening of the "New Bridge" created an explosion of newcomers the Westbank had never seen before. The City of Gretna's population of 13,813

in 1950 would almost double to its highest number ever of 24,875 by 1970.

Advertisements in 1960 for the huge new development of Terrytown mentioned Westside Shopping Center as being nearby. Oakwood Shopping Center opened eight years later in 1966 as the first air conditioned mall in the area. Lakeside Shopping Center opened in 1960, but was not enclosed or air conditioned until 1968.

Unfortunately, many of these stores are no longer around. Maison Blanche, is no longer in business, but its beloved mascot, the famous

"Mister Bingle," is now sold at Dillard's.

ABOUT THE GHS AND HOW TO JOIN

The Gretna Historical Society was founded in Gretna, Louisiana, in 1969, by Lloyd E. Gomez (insurance man, volunteer firefighter, and community activist), who descended from Gretna pioneers, German immigrants Claudius and Catherine Nuss Strehle. The Society's articles of incorporation were drafted by Gretna attorney Everette F. Gauthreaux and signed in his law office on October 26, 1969. Today, the GHS operates the Gretna Historical Society Museum Complex at the corner of Lafayette Street at Second. It consists of three 19th century Creole cottages, a blacksmith shop, and the Louisiana Fire Museum. The GHS also owns and maintains the caboose and train depot on Huey P. Long Avenue at Fourth Street.

There are no requirements for membership in the GHS, other than the timely payment of annual membership dues of \$20 per person. Monthly meetings are held at the St. Joseph's Auditorium at 7th and Newton Streets on the second Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. Guests and prospective members are always welcome to attend the meetings.

The society's newsletter, *Gretna Chronicles*, is published monthly and mailed or emailed to all members.
